# Year 7 & 8 News

#### **Auckland Writers' Festival**

When we went to the Aotea Centre on Tuesday 16th of May 2023 for the Auckland Writers' Festival, we had to be at school by 8:00 because we needed to leave school at 8:15. It took an hour and a half to get to the Aotea Centre. When we got there, we walked up the stairs inside of the Aotea Centre into the huge Auditorium housing over 1,000 people all watching the performances. All of us Year 7 and 8 boys had a row to ourselves, to our left sat the girls, in a different row, along with the two parents and our teacher who came along with us to the festival. The lights dimmed and the performances started.

The first speaker was Jason Reynolds, who wrote about his past life experiences, growing up being poor while gun and drug violence were frequent issues that took the lives of many of his friends. Some of his stories are also extremely famous. He collaborated with Marvel to create 'Miles Morales', the original idea or meaning of this story is the quote "Feel like you are the only superhero in your family."

The second speakers were Johanna Emeney and Sarah Laing discussing their story 'Sylvia And The Birds', a story about Johanna's local bird lady, Sylvia Durrant. It discusses Sylvia's life story of how she grew up as a foster child and how she eventually came to release over 140,000 birds back into the wild. It also has stories about her 20 year old apprentice, Charlie, and some of their stories of saving and releasing birds together.

Afterwards, we had a lunch break. We sat down on the carpet to eat, and then we were allowed to either go down to the floor below to get autographs, which had a massive line, or we were allowed to explore the building, get water, and go to the toilet.

For the penultimate speaker, we had Mary-anne Scott and her book 'The Tomo'. It is about a dog who falls down a tomo and has to get rescued by its owner. The story is based on a true story of Mary's grandfather whose dog, Spot, fell down a tomo while chasing a sheep. The dog waited three days for its owner to come back to rescue it. A tomo is a hole in the ground leading to a cave. Mary has also written many other stories, such as Fantastic Mr Bean, Sticking With Pigs and Spearo.

The last speakers for the day were Dahlia and Mani Malaeulu whose books 'Taina Samoa' and 'Tama Samoa' express the feelings of those with Samoan origins living in New Zealand, explaining their experiences. Tama Samoa touches on the experiences of Mani, growing up as a Samoan boy, showing how they struggle with things like the expectations of others, that Samoan men are big burly rugby players and that if you don't play rugby you must be a wimp. For Taina Samoa it includes all of Dahlia's experiences, growing up as a Samoan girl, and expressing how she lived in 'two worlds' speaking only Samoan at home and English everywhere else.

Once the event was over we were all driven back to school, and waited for our parents there. I went home inspired to write a story.
